Appendix

Recommendation from Blackford Community Funds Panel.

At the Panel meeting on Thursday 15th February, the Panel agreed to support an application from the Blackford Improvement Group to contribute to the cost of re-developing the park in the centre of Blackford adjacent to the Primary School into a safe and inclusive play and recreational space, picnic area and garden space for the enhancement and well-being of the whole community both young and old. The grant of £45,774 would represent about 36% of the total project cost, budgeted at £124,773.

Foundation Scotland and the Community Council are in the final stages of reviewing Fund Agreements and this large grant enquiry has been received during this period. Given the timing of the project, the encouraging overall performance of the Blackford Endowment since inception, the encouraging level of community interest in and support for the project, the Panel agreed to consider the Application subsequent to accepting an initial Enquiry from the BIG group at the Panel's November meeting and at which point the project was deemed eligible.

Since November Foundation Scotland has done a thorough independent assessment of the project and is satisfied that the project has been thoroughly planned, that appropriate technical advice has been sought, that required match funding is in place, that the project will be competently managed going forward, that there is wide support for the project within Blackford and that it will bring significant impact to the community and serve as a legacy project for the Fund.

By way of context, Foundation Scotland's current investment policy recommends that drawing down up to 4% of the capital from a Fund where there is predictable, year on year grant-making required and to ensure sustainable capital value of the Endowment is sustained. At the time of the Fund's establishment it was actually 6%. However the Blackford Fund has a bespoke context since it also now receives annually up to a minimum of £10,000 from wind farm income and demand for grants from groups is not predictable. Therefore the 4% guidance in the Blackford context is arguably less relevant since it has not actually been applied and less has been withdrawn from the Fund over the years.

In its decision to support this request the Panel took guidance from Foundation Scotland who advised that as of Dec 31 2016 the Fund value was £416,000. It was reported that the Growth and Income Fund for Charities fell by 2.3% in the quarter to Dec 16 but grew 14.5% in the calendar year to Dec 2016. In the month to 31 Jan 2017 the Fund had grown by a further £3,000. Foundation Scotland also advised that the grant equates roughly to 10% of the Fund which has grown significantly since inception and which can probably cope with this withdrawal and that the grant effectively equates to the performance gains of the last year or so. However, Foundation Scotland also reminded the Panel that the long term effect of course depends on future investment performance and the requested levels of withdrawals going forward.

The Panel had the opportunity to thoroughly review the application, assessment and supporting materials and also interview the applicant and were satisfied that the project represented a sensible use of some of the Endowment that would provide long term, tangible benefit for the community.

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In making this decision they also took account of the four critical factors to take into consideration as stated in the Panel Terms of Reference, one of the governance documents still under review between Foundation Scotland and the Blackford Community Council, namely:

- The performance of the Fund over the previous year;
- The need to include a contribution to Foundation Scotland;
- The need to preserve the value of the Fund in real terms;
- The need to release funds for grant-making

The Panel is requesting the Community Council to endorse this important decision, mindful that it is an important decision and a departure from the usual level of award approved by the Panel.

To emphasise again, the Panel does appreciate the various Fund governance documents have still to be finalised but would wish to stress that the application is time sensitive and various important committed funds from other sources could be compromised if there were further delays. It is fair to say that this grant would assure other funders that the total funds required for the project had been achieved and the project could commence. It will not commence without the grant from the Blackford Fund and would likely be abandoned.

Given the significant voluntary effort by the applicant to date and other reasons already stated the Panel were of the view that the request is supported and the drawdown instructed. In the event of the Fund therefore not performing so well in the coming months this sum would be protected within the Blackford Community Fund and retained to support the park project in line with any stipulated conditions. These will include for example stipulation that a copy of all the submitted tenders is provided, together with the evaluation of the tenders; that the Panel reserves its right to reduce the amount of the award in the event of an underspend in the project and that the Council provides written commitment to not renege on a verbal commitment not to sell the land at a later date and/or that if this were to ever happen they would move the equipment and the surfacing to another fit for purpose site within the village.

The Panel looks forward to the Community Council's endorsement of this decision
