# Blackford Community Fund

## **Fund report**

1 Jan 2016 - 31 March 2017

#### Introduction

The Blackford Community Fund is a charitable Fund linked to an Endowment Fund that was originally created in 2009 with a donation of  $\pounds 250,000$  to Blackford Community Council by Ochil Developments, the developer of the G West development near Blackford. The Endowment Fund, managed by Foundation Scotland on behalf of the community, is intended to be a lasting resource for the community of Blackford.

As well as being able to draw down funds from the Endowment, the community also receives an annual payment of at least £12,000 from the combined community benefit payments from EDF-ER Energy Renewables Burnfoot Hill, Burnfoot North and Rhodders Wind Farms. This arrangement started in 2011 and will continue for the life time of these wind farms which is expected to be 25 years.

The Fund supports community groups and charities working in the Blackford Community Council area that are providing activities or services which **promote community spirit and bring people together**, **enhance quality of life and promote people's well-being** and **foster a vibrant sustainable community**.

Projects that benefit older residents of the community are particularly welcome.

Grant requests support a wide range of costs and activities, including equipment costs, running costs for local groups, sessional worker costs and maintenance or refurbishment of community facilities etc.

The Blackford Panel makes decisions on how the Fund is spent, and promotes the Fund locally. The Panel comprises one member from the Blackford Community Council appointed by the Community Council, a representative of Ochil Developments and five other local residents.

During this period the Panel has comprised the following members:

David MacDonald (Chair), Graham McNaughton, Allan King (representing G West/ Ochil Developments UK Ltd), Irene McLaughlan (representing Blackford Community Council), Bill Gemmell, Iain Paton and Andrew Sinclair.

During 2016, Foundation Scotland has been working with the Community Council to review and refresh the documentation that governs the Blackford Community Fund. This work is still in progress and will complete later in 2017.

In the period from 1 January 2016 to 31 March 2017, a total of 24 applications to the Fund were received over two rounds. 23 awards were made totalling  $\pounds$ 24,017 with one group being asked to meet some outstanding conditions on a previous grant prior to receiving further support. One grant was returned in this period because the project could not proceed due to hall refurbishments.

The average award over the report period was £1,044 compared to £1,021 in the previous reporting period. The lowest award was £163 (made to the Historical Society) and the highest award at the standard level of award of £1,500 was awarded 10 times. This is a clear indication that the raising of the maximum grant award from £1000 to £1500 in the previous period continues to assist groups to deliver activities in the context of ever increasing costs of goods and services.

Alongside this 'regular' grant-making the Panel also approved a large grant to the Blackford Improvement Group for a significant legacy project. The project had secured significant community support prior to coming to the Panel and will help develop an area of land adjacent to Blackford Primary School into a safe and inclusive play and recreational space, picnic area and garden space for the enhancement and well-being of the whole community both young and old.

#### What difference is the Fund making?

The Fund continues to be a valuable resource for Blackford, supporting the many varied activities and projects of community groups that themselves are providing a range of educational and social opportunities for Blackford residents. The following reports have already been received from groups

that received grants in this period:

**Blackford Sings** reported that "the grant partly funded the project cost, with the remainder coming from the group's reserves. 25 people benefited from the professional choir leader, who has provided valuable input and helped the group to consolidate membership numbers and progress. The choir meets roughly 14 times each session with a break over summer. Membership grew significantly following a promotion event. The group have had three public performances, including a local historic society celebration of Killiecrankie and at a Christmas event with other choirs in Dunblane. They also undertook a self-funded trip to Celtic Connections. The group has bonded socially and include three members from families new to the area who have used the group to get to know the village. As the group continue to progress and expand their repertoire with the aid of the choir leader they hope to perform more frequently."

**Blackford Senior Citizens Lunch Club** continues to thrive with support from the Fund. They reported that "the grant partly funded the project cost, with the remainder coming from a donation from Highland Spring. The group also held a fundraising raffle at the spring lunch. The Christmas party included a buffet meal and entertainment. It was attended by 70 senior citizens. The spring outing was held on 13 April 2017 and attended by 72 people. A 2-course lunch was provided, followed by entertainment. Transportation was provided for people with mobility issues who are otherwise housebound. The events provide much needed social interaction and entertainment for local seniors. Feedback has been very positive."

A new group, **Blackford Events Group** received an initial award to assist with a community fireworks display. The grant partly funded the project costs, with the remainder coming from sponsorship from local businesses. The fireworks display and after party with live music at the local bowling club was well attended, and the group raised £1,641.61 in voluntary donations, which will go to help a local resident who suffers from cerebral palsy and requires treatment abroad. The grant played a large part in allowing the event to go ahead, and was very motivating for the group to have their first event be so successful.
